7. MORE HORNETS HOOPS MEMORIES. Our recent articles about Hornet sports teams of the past prompted these great memories from Ray Blosse' (65): "I have read with fond memories the recent recollections of SHS alumni about the basketball team successes in the early and mid-sixties. This coming March will be the 50 year anniversary of perhaps the greatest wins of the SHS basketball saga during the Maryland State AA Tournament. I had the great fortune of playing on both the very good SHS '64 and '65 teams. A big part of the story to be told about these two teams was the twist of fate that brought some of the players, myself included, to SHS in the first place. This twist of fate was the bussing of a large contingent of kids from "northern" PG County (Hillcrest/Marlow Heights) to Clinton, to attend SHS. This was done to alleviate the potential overcrowding of Suitland High for the '62-'63 school year. So this sweep of the pen by the School Board brought together two different communities of kids at SHS in September, 1962. Mixed feelings existed initially all around by most all concerned. And so began the change in SHS classification up to the AA level for its sports teams – this influx of bussed students pushed SHS to having 605 males enrolled, which exceeded the AA requirement of

enrolled boys by 5. So SHS would now be competing in the PG County AA leagues with the largest schools in the County (and State).

So the fact that the SHS basketball teams of '64 and '65 won the PG County championship and got to the State Tournament in back to back years was an accomplishment considering the level of competition these teams faced. While I always believed the '64 team was the better overall team, fate seemed to smile on the '65 team. The '65 team was a tough group of mostly senior "grinders" that surrounded the "Jolly Green Giant" Norm Carmichael. This team was a true reflection of its coach, the oft referenced Bob Vaughn. We were disciplined hustlers with Norm at the center as our primary "go to guy" much of the time. But there were those times when the "grinders" had to step it up. And that time was best exemplified by the State Tournament semifinal game in '65. We played an Allegany HS team that came to the tournament as heavy favorites with a regular season record of 19-1. They were very tall and very talented. And to make the story even more dramatic was the fact that our go to guy, Norm, spent much of the semi-final game in foul trouble and in fact fouled out with the game tied and just over 3 minutes to play. So it was "grinder" time, or else. And so the Lee Smith, Bill East, Larry Schilling and sophomore Al Thomas "grinders" delivered the unthinkable upset of Allegany 68-62. Coach Vaughn was later quoted "that the victory over Allegany probably was my biggest thrill as a coach".

The '65 team had to then turn around and play the Tournament Finals game the next night against another favored team, Parkville HS, from Baltimore. This time the script played out with Norm having a career game as he scored 34 points and we held on for a close 64-61 win and the State AA Championship.

I'd be remiss if I didn't also mention one other very good team that I had the good fortune to be a part of, and that was the '65 baseball team. This was a group who toiled in relative anonymity without the benefit of a great coach like Bob Vaughn. Our coach in '65 was the JV football coach, Sam Smith. Apparently no one else would take the job, so to Sam's credit he took the reins of what turned out to be a very competitive ball club. In fact, we came within one game of adding another County Championship to the annals of the Class of '65. Playing on the old Millers field next to the school, the likes of Mike Fahey, Rich Wechsler, Tom Fort, Dave McClain, Jim Bostwick, Reggie Masano and Jay James, did SHS proud.

Needless to say, that long bus ride I took along with a lot of other kids from my neighborhood turned out to be the best bus ride I would ever take. Ray"

8. THE TUESDAY BOOTS -- SURRATTSVILLE'S ROCK HERITAGE GETS

RENEWED EXPOSURE. Mark Opasnick, the author of the encyclopedia of the history of rock music in the DC area, "Capitol Rock," is preparing an updated edition that will have

increased coverage for a number of Surrattsville bands, including The Tuesday Boots, Butler's Orchard and DC Star. We've received preliminary summary histories of those storied Surrattsville musicians that we'll share in these e-Notices, and considerable and fascinating additional detail will be included in Mark's upcoming volume.

Here's the summary history of perhaps the grandparent of all things rock at Surrattsville, The Tuesday Boots:

"The Tuesday Boots originally formed in Clinton, MD as The Cavaliers in late 1964-65 with the original band members (and Surrattsville High School classmates) being the three Barkley brothers (Ron, Russ, and Jerry) and Ron Lilly. An early photo of the band can be found at the Surrattsville High School Foundation website. Ron Barkley played lead guitar and sang lead on most vocals, with Ron Lilly playing rhythm guitar and contributing vocals, Jerry Barkley on drums and vocals, and Russ Barkley on bass. The band started out playing at local parties and then at occasional dances at schools in the Clinton and Camp Springs area. Within months the name of the band was changed to the Tuesday Boots, apparently modified from a song titled Thirsty Boots.

As the Tuesday Boots band perfected its craft and became more widely known, the band expanded its performances from parties and school dances to numerous dance clubs in the DC area (such as Georgetown clubs the Crazy Horse, the Silver Dollar, Fallen Angel, and the Cellar Door), Maryland (military base clubs, a variety of bars and dance clubs, etc.), and Virginia area and even appeared on local TV dance shows. The band also made a rare appearance in southeastern Pennsylvania but mostly played in the greater DC area.

The band eventually linked up with Fordy Thompson, a talent booking agent (who also managed the popular band Little Joe and the Imperials), around 1966-67 which thereby helped to further increase its playing opportunities at clubs and military bases in the greater DC area. During that time, the band added a fifth member, Bruce MacPherson, as keyboard player. In the Fall of 1967, Russ Barkley was the first member to leave the band (for college). He was replaced on bass by Jan Zukowski. Dennis Boone eventually replaced Ron Lilly on guitar.

The band continued to play often and widely in the greater DC area until 1970 before dissolving with Ron Barkley moving on to play music with another band, Leaves of Grass, before eventually heading to Los Angeles. Jan Zukowski left the Tuesday Boots to eventually play with the Cherry People, another highly popular band in the greater DC area. Jerry Barkley continued playing drums for a while with Dennis and Daryl Boone in the band, Boones Farm. Ron Barkley later returned to the Baltimore, Maryland area before eventually moving to Florida to play with various bands, including more recently, The Gulf Coasters.

Jerry Barkley also eventually moved to Florida and periodically rejoined his brother, Ron, to play in various bands. Ron Barkley died in 2006 and Ron Lilly in 2005. While the Tuesday Boots never recorded any commercial records, it was a highly popular group in the DC area during the 1964-1970 period. (Note: More recently this band name was adopted by a progressive

folk music group from Cork County, Ireland, that now has a presence on YouTube but has no relation to the original band or its members)."

13. <u>CLASS OF 39 FEATURED IN POST ARTICLE, con't.</u> Here is a continuation of an item in the last e-Notice about a June 25, 1984 Washington Post article by Eugene Meyer sent in by Paul Monaghan (59):

"Class of '39 Surrattsville High Recalled ... If the class left no visible monument, one still exists, the 40-year reunion book said, "in the lives, the homes, the families and the communities of the class members. It is a piece of America. Life has been easier for some than for others. But can anyone say for sure which one is better off than another? Love, happiness, fame, wealth, power have touched us all to some degree. So have sadness and despair. Who would you trade places with?"

Until recent years, former principal Klein, now 81, had attended the reunions. "The last time, I got lost," he said from the nursing home outside Boonsboro. "They had changed the road, and I landed in Camp Springs." Two of their teachers attended the reunion Saturday and their former students, now in their 60s, still referred to them as "Mr. Compton" and "Mr. Wyvill." They all watched silent movies made during their school years by Fred Bickford, who has stayed close to the class although he finished at Western High in the District. Four classmates came from Florida, and one each from Texas, Colorado and California. But mostly they came from nearby.

Ernest Loveless' absence was the most conspicuous. Not only had he been the class president but he, along with Audrey Smith, had made the class reunions a pet project over the years. He had even been scheduled to preside over the weekend event, and just before his operation for a benign brain tumor, had spoken warmly of his high school years and classmates. They, in turn, spoke warmly of him. In leading the invocation, Frank Selby said, "We pray tonight for Ernie Loveless and any others that are not here." Present was Loveless' son-in-law, John Holtz, who filmed on video tape the event as well as individual messages from his classmates for the convalescing judge.

Each classmate left with a message from Loveless, contained in the reunion book and read aloud by Ken Smith: "Our class motto was taken from Longfellow's 'Psalm of Life' and the footprints that we have made in the sands of time may not long be remembered, but certainly we have done the best we could to achieve this goal. We should add another stanza from the "Psalm of Life' – not to our motto, but to our individual resolutions. Regardless of the problems from which we might encounter from time to time ... 'Let us then be up and doing, with a heart for any fate; still achieving, still pursuing, learn to labor and to wait."
