2. <u>SURRATTSVILLE COMMUNITY LOSES BELOVED EDUCATOR</u>. We were sad to learn of the death last month of one of Surrattsville's most beloved educators, Ben Collins. Ben taught at Surrattsville from 1967 until 1995, and inspired generations of SHS students. A memorial gathering is being planned for later this Fall in Accokeek. The following is a brief overview of Ben's extraordinary life.

Benjamin F. Collins, July 8, 1940-September 12, 2017. Ben's favorite homily was "I've gone to look for myself. If I should return before I get back, keep me here." Ben took a fascinating path

through life. Born in Chattanooga, Tennessee to Benjamin, a Baptist minister, and Nancy Jones, an educator who shared a love of learning with Ben and his younger brother Jim, he approached life as an adventurer, explorer and seeker of knowledge who shared what he knew. Ben graduated from Carson Newman College in 1962 with a degree in history, which became a lifelong passion, and headed east to teach high school in Prince Georges County, Maryland. There he met his wife and lifelong partner Judy. Together the couple joined the Peace Corps, and from 1964 through 1967 served in Turkey, where they became immersed in the fascinating history and culture of the region.

Upon their return Ben joined the staff of Surrattsville High School, where he taught challenging and demanding college-level social studies classes. Also a sponsor of the Student Government Association and a Cross Country Coach, his students immediately embraced him, both as a teacher and as a kind, caring friend. During the summer months in the 1970s and 1980s, Ben led some twenty groups of students on study trips to the Mediterranean, including Italy, Greece, Turkey and Egypt, sharing his immense knowledge of history and culture as well as his inquisitive desire to learn.

In 1983 Ben was honored by the Washington Post as a recipient of the first Agnes Meyer Outstanding Teacher Award. And in 1987 he was featured in the Washington Magazine article "How to Change a Life: Great Teachers Have a Gift." Along the way he earned a Masters in Area Studies at Georgetown University, and enjoyed all that Washington DC had to offer. Ben shared his love of travel, learning and enjoying life with his sons Chris and David. Among their best memories are trips to Capitals and Bullets games accompanied by their favorite friends and their father. Who else would take a bunch of elementary kids to a game alone?

Ben truly believed and taught that, in the words of Harry S. Truman, "for our day and our children's day, education must become a continuing adventure in human understanding, shared by all." When retirement time arrived, Ben and Judy chose Pagosa Springs, Colorado as their home, where many friends and students visited and continued to keep in touch. Ben had lots of time to read, to enjoy the new friends he made there, to volunteer as a docent at the Fred Harmon Art Museum, and, above all, to continue his search for knowledge. His years were a rich tapestry with friends from all walks of life, whom he always treated with dignity while accepting and enjoying their individual differences.

Ben leaves behind his wife Judy, sons Chris (wife Maria) and David (wife Sandi and granddaughters Christina and Damia), and his brother Jim. He will be dearly missed by all of those who called him Mr. Collins, Dad, Grand Daddy and Gentle Ben. As the sign on Ben's desk says, "Keep smiling it makes people wonder what you are up to."

4. ACHIEVEMENT AWARD RECEPIENT FEATURED IN HOME & DESIGN

MAGAZINE AND BOCA GRANDE, FL NEWSPAPER. Some of our readers noticed references to 2003 Foundation Achievement Award recipient Kevin Fitzgerald in an article in the Fall 2017 Home & Design magazine for DC/MD/VA. Specifically, in the article entitled "Waterfront Idyll" about architect Marta Hansen's "dream house" on Whitehall Bay, a photograph of the kitchen containing a large painting by Kevin carried the caption "The living space is anchored on one end by the kitchen (right) which showcases an oil painting by Kevin Fitzgerald."

And here are some lovely excerpts from a full-page spread (with color photos) by art collector Barbara Hughes about Kevin's paintings that recently appeared in the Boca Grande, FL Beacon: "Once in a great while, we come across an artist who stands far above and apart from the others. We take special notice of this one and follow their progress. If we are fortunate, they stay on mark and don't deviate from where their spirits guide them. It's difficult, if not impossible, to hide disingenuousness when someone lives and expresses as an artist, simply because their core is out there for everyone to see. Artists live lives of transparency, which few among us have the courage or tenacity to live.

I've known Kevin Fitzgerald and admired his paintings for many years. His work mesmerized me back in the late 1990s and my appreciation has only grown. Enchantments are wonderful things – sort of like stepping back into Druid-time or someplace long past – deep and full of earthiness. Fitzgerald's paintings come at us with a quiet, but sure, contemplation – a haunting familiarity, which silently celebrates the immense intensity of our natural world, begging us to move into them, unafraid to surrender so they can take us on their moody journey into the heart of wherever they have decided to go – we are willing participants …"

Quoting Keith Bellows from National Geographic Traveler Magazine, Barbara notes "People are desperate for authenticity ... and Kevin is very real. Many artists do what is fashionable, but not him. He looks at landscape and channels the energy of the place into the painting."

7. <u>SUBJECTS OF SURRATTSVILLE-RELATED ACCLAIMED DOCUMENTARIES</u> <u>CONTINUE TO BE RECOGNIZED IN NATIONAL PRESS</u>. As we have reported

previously, two new acclaimed documentary films have Surrattsville connections: "Anacostia Delta" and "Rumble." (The former features, prominently, 2011 Foundation Achievement Award recipients John Previti (72) and Dave Chappell (75). The latter features Teen Club performer Link Wray, and there are on-screen comments by Hornets Sherry Wray and the film's technical advisor Greg Laxton (81).)

Some of our readers noticed that the monthly "bible" for guitar players, Guitar Player magazine, in its October 2017 50th anniversary edition, recognized Southern Maryland's Danny Gatton (a primary focus of "Anacostia Delta" and considered by many to be the finest electric guitar player of all time) in three places. (John Previti (72) was Danny's bassist for 18 years.) On page 40, the magazine lists Danny as one of the handful of greatest guitarists of the decade of the 1980s. On page 44, the magazine features Danny's 1989 cover shot as typifying the guitarists being celebrated in 1989. Finally, on page 54, the magazine notes Danny's "Unfinished Business" CD (on which John Previti played bass) as being one of the great guitar albums of all times, quoting Danny with this perfect (for this e-Notice item) six-degrees-of-separation comment: "Part of the ability to play various styles correctly is attitude. There should be nothing condescending when you play something simple. I appreciate Link Wray's 'Rumble' as much as I do Les Paul's 'How High the Moon.'"

9. <u>MORE PRICELESS TREASURES FROM "GREEN LIGHT</u>." As we previously noted, in 2015 Duke Coleman (53) donated to the Foundation's Archives a number of copies of an early SHS student newspaper, the "Green Light." Those editions provide a fascinating glimpse into student life at Surrattsville during the 52-53 academic year, <u>65</u> years ago! Here's an interesting excerpt from the May 7, 1953 edition of Green Light:

"Boomerang Honors Mrs. Holland: Mrs. Holland was the name on the dedication page of the attractive yearbooks which arrived this week. For four years, Mrs. Holland has sponsored this class which becomes increasingly important these next few weeks. One of the highlights of their activities was the Killarney Katch, originated by this very same group. Much of the credit for the new and original treatment of material in the book is due to the efforts of the staff and Mrs. Robin who has a reputation, well-deserved, for sponsoring fine yearbooks. The Boomerang itself is cased in the traditional green and white, and is chock full of excellent photographs, scandid and posed. Subscribers seem well pleased and this new tribute to Surrattsville is in keeping with the progress in our school of which we are all aware."
