While at Surratts, Trinity served as SGA 2nd Vice President, varsity boys' basketball manager, Vice President of the Future Educators of America, and played on the varsity girls' soccer team. She was active in Girl Scouts and Delta GEMS, as well as at her church. Trinity was very active in numerous other community service activities, ranging from serving as an elementary school science fair judge to packing holiday food baskets for the needy.

ALEXIS GLENN, who plans to attend Hampton University in the Fall, was awarded a General Fund Scholarship. While at Surratts, Alexis maintained a GPA of 3.9, not receiving a grade less than A beginning in her sophomore year. Alexis served as Senior Class President, National Honor Society President, Yearbook Editor, cheerleading captain, track team captain, Peer Leader, and Counseling Department Ambassador. She was awarded the cheerleading squad's MVP Award, and was on the Principal's Honor Roll.

While at Surratts, Drew maintained Honor Roll standing while taking courses like AP Literature and Pre-Calculus. 2. FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES 2017 ACHIEVEMENT AWARD RECIPIENTS! The Foundation Board also is delighted to announce these extraordinary recipients of the Foundation's 2017 Achievement Awards:

LEE PERRON (71). After a long and successful career in the cable television industry in California (ending with a stint as President of Adelphia's Southern California region), Lee and his wife Sandy retired to the Gulf Coast of Florida. Determined to use his energies to better his community, Lee volunteers his time tutoring elementary school students, and utilizes his business expertise to manage the non-profit Englewood Farmers' Market (englewoodfarmersmarket.org) which he founded in November 2011. Starting with just a handful of vendors and attendees, the Market has grown to a major weekly event having an eight-month season, drawing hundreds of vendors and hundreds of thousands of attendees each year. A central purpose of the market is educational, offering nutrition and healthy eating information to the community. The Market piloted a program – now spreading well beyond Englewood -- to acquire grant dollars that double the buying power of low-income individuals using their SNAP cards to purchase healthy Florida-grown items at the Market. The Market also has acquired infrastructure improvements from local governments and has spurred significant economic growth around its location in the "Old Englewood Village" section of Englewood, Florida. In early 2016, the University of Florida released a study that outlined the very significant positive economic impact the Market has had on the local economy.

LYDIA INGLETT (77). Lydia is the publisher and CEO of Lydia Inglett, Ltd. With a 40-year career as a book publishing professional, Lydia is considered an expert and innovator in the book publishing industry. She began her publishing career at the age of 17 in Washington, DC at New Republic Magazine and Book Company. Lydia founded her own company in 1977 when she graduated from Surrattsville and has built it into a unique publishing house model, with more benefits going to its authors. Lydia often convinces first-time authors to publish by personally walking them through every step of the process. She skillfully handles the design and the

publishing for authors, artists, museums and galleries. A Southerner by birth, today her global book publishing company, Lydia Inglett Ltd, along with its distribution and book selling subsidiary, Starbooks, spread the joy of high-quality, fine books across the South and across the world.

Highly awarded, LIP and Starbooks publish beautiful, saleable books on subjects ranging from the Lowcountry of the South to Paris and beyond. As winners of multiple Independent Publisher IPPY Awards, IBPA's Ben Franklin Awards, and USA Book Awards Lydia's companies regularly compete with the industry's largest publishing houses. In 2015 alone, Lydia won seven national awards. Lydia also has structured corporate identities and brand start-ups. Lydia is a member of the Stanford University Publishing Alumni and lectures regularly on books and publishing in today's world. Lydia is known as an innovator for combining books, technology and people in unique and entertaining ways. She resides on Hilton Head Island, SC and in the UK with her English husband, Jolyon Griffiths. MARK MOTTERN (88). Mark has had a very distinguished career in the field of broadcast journalism. He is a multiple Emmy Award-winning television producer for the nationally syndicated entertainment news program Extra and has been awarded the prestigious Edward R. Murrow Award for excellence in reporting. A graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Mark began his broadcasting career in Raleigh, North Carolina. As a reporter for the local Fox television affiliate, Mark covered a wide variety of major news stories, served as a media witness to a state execution, and was honored by the Radio-Television News Directors Association for his reporting on the brutal murder of a law enforcement officer. Mark continued his career as an investigative reporter/news anchor at the NBC affiliate in Wichita, Kansas. He exposed a convicted sex offender working as a school bus driver, helped to unlock a 25 year-old murder case centering on the BTK Strangler, and exposed a heartbreaking puppy mill. He also reported on national news stories including the destruction leveled by a devastating F-4 tornado and provided round-the-clock, live coverage of a massive grain elevator explosion that killed seven trapped workers. Mark's work earned him two Kansas Association of Broadcasters Awards and the prestigious Edward R. Murrow Award for excellence in reporting.

In 1999, Mark moved to the nation's second largest broadcast market and became a reporter for KCBS, the CBS affiliate in Los Angeles. His breaking news coverage included covering everything from wildfires to mudslides to the crash of Alaska Airlines Flight 261. After the intense coverage of the September 11th attacks, Mark decided it was time to trade in hard news for the lighter side of broadcasting life. As a Supervising Producer for Extra, Mark is often on the red carpet, covering movie premieres and major award shows including the Oscars, Grammys and Emmys. Mark also can be seen on the field and on the court, providing coverage of major sporting events including the Super Bowl, World Series and NBA Finals. The show has taken Mark around the world from the Toronto Film Festival in Canada to the Cannes Film Festival in France and to the Sundance Film Festival in Park City, Utah. Mark's years of experience in interviewing, reporting and being both in front of and behind the camera has made him a valuable and respected producer in the industry.

The meeting was organized by the National Institutes of Health and was led by its director, Dr. Francis Collins. Leaders in the medical, education and research joined executives from companies who invest in biotech to provide analysis and real-life examples of how America's sustained leadership in the biomedical industry has resulted in immeasurable benefits to both our country's economic and physical well-being. Among the participants were Bill Ford, the CEO of General Atlantic; Dr. Craig Thompson, the president of Memorial Sloan Kettering

Cancer Center; Dr. Cornelia Bargmann, the president of science at the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative; Dr. Marc Tessier-Lavigne, president of Stanford University; and Dr. Rick Lifton, the president of Rockefeller University."

15. MORE PRICELESS TREASURES FROM "GREEN LIGHT." As we previously noted, in 2015 Duke Coleman (53) donated to the Foundation's Archives a number of copies of an early SHS student newspaper, the "Green Light." Those editions provide a fascinating glimpse into student life at Surrattsville during the 52-53 academic year, 65 years ago! Here are some interesting excerpts from the January 15, 1953 edition of Green Light:

"Clubs: The desires of the students in our Jr.-Sr. High School have been expressed in regard to clubs. Monday morning Mr. Pryde announced in a very encouraging voice that everyone was to choose three clubs he or she would like to see formed. There have been many suggestions for new clubs to be formed and for continuation of old clubs. In the Senior Class there is a group, as yet small, that would like to form a "Religious Club" for the purpose of discussing world problems from the standpoint of religion, and to study the scriptures and different acts and religions. There has also been a strong desire expressed to continue the dramatics club and Hi-Y. Other groups in school have expressed desires to become members of such clubs as A Cappella, Science, Projection, Jr. Hi-Y, dancing and others.

A Kamera Klatch for Shutterbugs: When a group of "shutterbugs" get together there's bound to be talk and more talk. So, a "See yourself as others see you" is an idea for a different kind of party. Ask all your friends who are camera friends to come over for a "kamera klatch." Ask them to bring along their collections of pictures, those taken a few years ago as well as their newer ones. If there is a movie maker among the group, perhaps he will bring the screen and projector, too. The serious side of photography can be discussed and many fine points exchanged. Then pause for refreshments with ice cream, a jelly roll and maybe your favorite beverage.

Who Am I: I have brown hair and blue eyes. I have enjoyed all the time I have spent at Surrattsville High School, which I am sorry to say is only five years. I am 5 feet 9 inches tall and weigh 170 pounds. I like hillbilly music. One of my favorite songs is "I'm A Ladies Man." My favorite sport is soccer. (Last week's Who Am I was Myra Rigor.)"

"Confession: One thing I forgot to mention about my adolescent years ... I was a mumbler. During some agonizing seventh grade moments, Mr. Frank Murphy attempted to correct me in front of the Core class many times, as we were being trained for public speaking impromptu on multiple subjects, and I was grilled about this damnable curse on a weekly basis. Nobody could understand what I said back then, so fast and low was my speech, sometimes finalized with a quick giggled end tag, a fast and low talking one-liner smart aleck. Years later, around 2007, Dr. Murphy and I met at an Italian restaurant at his request and dime, and over lunch proceeded to find if I was willing to work with middle school kids. "Wayne, what I need is for someone to motivate them, to ask them about their future plans. Someone who can reach them where they are. Someone they can trust and yet enjoy. What I need Wayne, is a smart@*&." Who knew? An educator on a recruiting mission for a wiseacre. Weirder things have happened. What I can reveal about my early teen years was that the most common response to my profound observational mini-bursts was: What?! Nowadays, having outgrown the "impediment," friends and acquaintances can't shut me up."
