10. <u>MORE HISTORICAL TREASURES FROM 1964-1967 SURVEYORS</u>! Here are more treasures from The Surveyor from the 1964-1967 period. Thanks to Nancy Miller (67) and the Class of 67 for donating these "journalistic time capsules" to the Foundation Archives!

The following are some excerpts from the January 1965 issue:

"Yearbook Progess Gains Momentum: 'The final copy for the Surrattsville yearbook must be sent to the Taylor Publishing Company in Dallas, Texas by March 15, 1065,' confirmed Susan Roley, the Boomerang editor. The format for the yearbook will include over 200 pages and an original cover design, bound in a 9 x 12 collegiate-sized volume. Definite plans have been made to include a senior superlative section, a special tribute to the late Don Rhoades, an exclusive reference to all of the athletic teams and activities, and a special candid display. Approximately one-half of the candid photographs that will appear in the yearbook have been taken, and other candids are scheduled for January and February, at which time photographs of all clubs and activities will also be completed. Susan also reported that exceptional photographs which were taken this year during the homecoming activities by the school photographer, Harry Merritt, will appear in an original section featuring school activities.

Gym Will Get New Look: Athletic additions for the gym are being planned by several art students. Three dimensional state, county and school seals are presently being built. The seals

are to be placed at one end of the gym. At the other end either flags or pennants from colleges and other higher schools attended by Surrattsville alumni will be attractively arranged. Mr. Pryde has asked various members of the Honor Society to write to either the alumni or the school they attend in order to obtain these banners. Carol Acree, Karen Kaufman, and Clarence Switzer worked on the state seal. The county seal was made by Jan Kaiser and Buddy Rhodes. Carol Acree, Tommy Prather and Pat Woodworth are now finishing the school seal. The seals are made from papier-mache and gesso, a very fine plaster which hardens on a plywood backing. They are then painted with enamel paint. Mrs. Hays feels that the seals will be a great contribution to the gym and the school."

11. ... AND MORE HISTORICAL TREASURES FROM "GREEN LIGHT." As we previously noted, in 2015 Duke Coleman (53) donated to the Foundation's Archives a number of copies of an early SHS student newspaper, the "Green Light." Those editions provide a fascinating glimpse into student life at Surrattsville during the 52-53 academic year, <u>66</u> years ago! Here are some excerpts from the May 7, 1953 edition:

"Hall Reporter: What do you think of the yearbook? Donna Drevenak-I think it's pretty good; I like it. Kenneth Moore-I think it's nice but too many pictures and not enough information. William Leonard-It's okay. It's pretty nice. Harriet Jones-It's pretty good but I don't like the teachers' pictures in with the students. Mrs. Merritt-I think it's excellent. A very nice piece of work. It showed a lot of originality. Dorothy Smith-Well, it's one way of getting pictures of everybody in the school. John Page-Neat! Margie Jones-I think it's very good; better than last year's. Mr. Pryde-It's very splendid. It does the school proud and the staff and the sponsors are to be commended for their efforts. Mrs. Sapp-Very nice. I like the theme.

Surratts Girls Working on Track and Field Events for Marlboro Meet: Surratts girls are on the field every day working on their track and field events in an attempt to win the track meet for the girls for the second year. Junior High girls are hoping for a third year champ as they have won the Junior High for two years. Many of the girls who participated last year are still in the same class – junior high and senior – but both softball teams lost a lot of girls to graduation. Eighth grade Jones is expected to win one or two events – she won the dash and standing broad jump last year. Ferrel and Mumford won first and third in running broad jump last year, but have been handicapped by a wet field this year. Outstanding girls in events this year as Sellner-dash, Deason-standing broad jump, Dumphy-softball throw, Simpkins-dash, Taylor-softball throw, Theunnisen-softball throw, Joyce and Janice Herbig-dashes and standing broad jump, Irving-standing broad jump. Seventh graders are King, Coleman, Hall, Kaplan, Irving, Gardner.

Ninth Grade Girls Go To Gwynn Park: All the ninth grade girls attended the ninth grade class play day at Gwynn Park last Monday afternoon. Twenty-eight girls joined the Sasscer girls on their bus here at Surratts and made the trip together. Four of Surratts' girls were on the winning team – Patricia Richardson, Carolyn Dill, Patricia Hyland and Arlene Callahan. They won every game in which they competed. Congratulations to these girls!"

With the exception of a few stalwarts who grew up listening to that new-fangled racket called 'Red Hot Jazz' by Bix Beiderbecke on the radio box, most of us were born during the administration of either Truman or Eisenhower, we remember where we were on the worst day of 1963 and whose house we were at when The Beatles first appeared on Ed Sullivan's show, feeling the frustration of explaining to the later generations about our music, having the ability to behave and be trusted as an adult in most situations as a teen, and the joyful kick of attending high school reunions. Wondering how most school activities and especially sports remain in the heart decades after the performances faded away. Our coaches and educators are fondly remembered, all things forgiven that needed to be. It's almost unfair that those days were so bliss-unbalanced compared to the present while framed in such a short block of years for the events and ambiance.

This is not a message of spiritual salvation – one cannot be saved by a peculiar blessing during a set timeframe, but it is with thankfulness that I was allowed to live in it and enjoy the adventure.

If you resided among us and enjoyed the same journey, remember the good days, that golden age, and walk with me my friends back to the place of our successes and defeats, because it all counts in the end.

I can still see my teachers from all schools, wonderful Tanglewood, Surrattsville of all three persuasions, and beautiful Crestview. Receiving my first trombone at Kitt's Music store in 1966, and remembering until this day the smell of brass and slide oil. The autumn field trips, costume parties, singing carols at Christmas, concerts, plays, and affairs of the heart, which were almost all year round after fifth grade. Later the sports teams, my short wrestling career, track and field, and a two year excursion into my favorite sport, cross country! I'd like to add student government, my heart meant well, but I wasn't prepared nearly enough for it. One of the surprise elements I lucked into was to be chosen as a singer for a very good band by the seasonally correct name of "Summer" in 1973. The funny thing is that I still stay in contact with all of the members, by way of email, face-to-face or social networking sites. Plus I stay in contact with the competing group "Butler's Orchard," fine gentlemen and lady all.

My Late Friends: I wrote this disconnected non-chronological series in honor of a lost age, but also to revisit the friendship of Dave Chesley. What an excellent person he was. Those who had the privilege to meet him will tell you that he was full of fun and adventure, in a subtle mostly non-harmful way if that makes sense. He married young, was a good husband and father plus a servant to his community. His final day in March of 2015 ended in a mystery. He hugged his wife, shook the dog's paw and instructed him to take care of his one and only. Then Mr. David Chesley drove off into eternity. His father Al passed in February of 2018. My on-off lady friend of junior high fame also died much too early, many others in this story as well. The only blessing I receive from this kind of depressing news is that I got to speak with many of these friends before they passed away. "Anna," the summer recreation counselor lives on. And I still haven't returned the 'Heroes of Crestview' photos borrowed back in the 80s from her.

In Closing: Turning off the time machine for the night. Been looking back where I've been for way too long, but the story has been told. I might be fit for the Kingdom of Heaven finally. Will always miss what was, though.

"NREIP and SEAP applications for 2019 due Oct. 31. The application period for both the 2019 college-level Naval Research Enterprise Internship Program (NREIP) and the 2019 high school-level Science and Engineering Apprenticeship Program (SEAP) is now through Oct. 31.

These programs provide an opportunity for students to participate in research at a Department of Navy (DoN) laboratory during the summer. NREIP provides competitively selected research internships for 475 college students (400 undergraduate students and 75 graduate students) each year, and SEAP provides 265 competitively selected research internships each year.

SEAP is open to high school students (16 years and older). It pays \$3,300 for new students and \$3,800 for returning students for the eight-week summer internship. More information and details about eligibility can be found at <u>http://seap.asee.org/</u>.

NREIP is a 10-week internship open to both undergraduate and graduate students. The stipend levels for NREIP are:

Level 1 (\$5,400): New (first-time) NREIP

Level 2 (\$8,100): Returning NREIP

Level 3 (\$10,800): Proof of enrollment in graduate school
