4. UPDATE FROM THE BAND DEPARTMENT AT THE SCHOOL. We received this nice update from SHS Band Director Valerie Dent: "I hope you are enjoying your summer. I wanted to send you a little update. The Band/Chorus Room renovation is still not finished, but the general contractor says they will be restarting the reno again at the end of the month or in September. The Band Boosters are attending School Board meetings to press for the renovation until it is completed. Thanks to the generous donations from SHS Foundation and the Band Boosters the SHS Orchestra now has five more string instruments to add to our new orchestra inventory, for a total of ten. The Orchestra size has grown for 14 last school year to 25 on the roster for 2014-2015. I have fund raisers planned so we can purchase three basses, three cellos, three violas and two violins.

The Marching Band added 25 new uniforms to the Auxiliary inventory for the upcoming school year. The Concert Band added two new oboes, and one refurbished tuba. The Concert Band will be fund raising to purchase New Concert Band uniforms (long black dresses and black tuxedos). I am looking forward to a great school year. Please thank the Foundation for me. 5. MEMORIES OF DONALD ENGLAND (53). We received this touching story about Donald England (53) from Duke Coleman (53), who has honored Donald's memory with his contributions to the Foundation:

"I don't know how much you know about this guy Donald England but I wanted to share just a little bit from a long time ago and a little bit of something I learned very recently. When we were 15 years old (1950) Donald had a paper route. He also had a motorized "Whizzer" bicycle. At the end of the month when it was time to "collect for the Star" he would frequently come by my house, pick me up and I think I rode the crossbar although it may have been the rear package rack. We found a way for both of us to ride and began the rounds up and down Pine View Lane, Stuart Lane, Simpson Lane, Ballard Drive and two or three more.

At the end of the route, Donald's pockets would be stuffed full of coins and dollar bills and we headed home. Except that his Wizard whizzed right by Stuart Lane where I lived and full speed by Pine View Lane where he lived. We usually made our first stop at Oliver's bar and restaurant in "Downtown Clinton." They had a bowling game thing in there where you slid hockey puck-like things at the pins. It was probably about 25 cents per game and Donald paid. He also paid for the hamburgers we would inevitably order. I think the drug store adjacent to Oliver's had just opened and our last stop was for a milkshake. (Donald paid.)

Probably that same year Donald decided to give up the paper route. He asked if I wanted to take over. My response was, "Does the Whizzer go with it?" It did not, but I took the job anyway. Donald England was a generous guy. His friendship and loyalty were unwavering. At an age when so many are so self-involved he wore a caring spirit like one more garment. During the school year beginning 1951, our junior year, Mr. Pryde our principal had a young relative from Pennsylvania. I presume it was a nephew whom he inserted into the class as a guest student. It should not be a surprise that Donald was the class member who reached out to our guest and

made him welcome. His name was Jim and he and Donald planned a trip to Coalport, PA where Jim lived. They planned to spend Thanksgiving holiday with Jim's family and return for the finish of the school year. Donald would drive them in his recently acquired new 1937 Plymouth.

On Thanksgiving morning at 1:30 a.m. on their way to Coalport and near the town of Clearfield on State Highway 53 the Plymouth failed to make a turn. The car hit a bridge abutment apparently at full speed and the crash was devastating. Both Jim and Donald were pinned in the wreckage and it reportedly took an hour to free them using torches. Donald died at the scene, very likely at the time of impact. Jim had many minor injuries and one leg was severely injured but he survived. It was not until the following Sunday morning that I got the news. Donald was already at his house in repose as was the practice at that time more so than today. Sometime around noon I went to the England house. Donald's mother answered the door. She hugged me and said, "Come in and see Donald." She told me they had told her Donald was on a road that he was not familiar with which ended in a dead-end that caught him by surprise. She took some comfort in that because it meant to her that it was not thought that he had been careless. She also showed me where it had been pointed out to her that they had "repaired" a very bad injury on his head. She took a little more comfort there saying to me, "I'm sure he never drew another breath after that."

A funeral service was held for Donald at Bells Methodist Church in Camp Springs. One of the Surratts school buses took most if not all of his classmates to the service. His gravesite is at Washington National Cemetery in Suitland, Maryland. (Section N Lot607) Both of his parents are close by. A photo of Donald's grave marker can be seen by using a GOOGLE search for: findagrave 11321201."

7. WASHINGTON POST ARTICLE REKINDLES TV MEMORIES. Some of our readers may have seen John Kelly's article in the June 12 Washington Post entitled "Old Shows Never Die. They Just Go To This U-MD Archive," about the Broadcast Archives maintained by the University of MD. The article begins: "If you're younger than, oh, 30, you won't believe me when I say this, but watching television used to be hard. ... TV wasn't always a free-flowing, never-ending, infinitely customizable infotainment birthright." Mr. Kelly notes that the Archives contain materials from D.C. favorites like the Pick Temple Show and the Ranger Hal show. (The article features a great photo of Pick Temple. Willard Scott's Bozo show and the genesis of The Muppets are not mentioned, but likely are included in the Archive.) Mr. Kelly points out that although we've gained a bottomless pool of TV content, we've lost "a shared experience and the satisfaction that comes when acquiring something isn't easy." He says: "Why, when I was a lad, TV shows followed a schedule as predictable and unalterable as the tides – and as unforgiving. If you had the misfortune of missing an episode, well then, next weeks' wasn't going to make much sense."

We'd be interested to hear our readers' stories about their experience with local TV in the last century.

8. CLASS OF 39 FEATURED IN POST ARTICLE. And speaking of Post articles, Paul Monaghan (59) sent the Foundation a copy of the Post from June 25, 1984 that contained this article by Eugene Meyer:

“Class of '39 Surrattsville High Recalled. ‘Lives of great men remind us, We too can make our lives sublime, And, departing, leave behind us, Footprints in the sands of time’ Longfellow, as quoted in the 1939 Surrattsville High School yearbook. Ernest A. Loveless, Jr., the class president and chief judge of Maryland’s Seventh Judicial Circuit, was recuperating from major surgery. Opal Price Harrison arrived in a wheelchair. Seven were gone, from Eugene Tayman who died in 1945 fighting fascism, to Eva Oursler Gorman, who died in 1982 of natural causes. But three wars, nine presidents and countless progeny later, 27 of the 37 surviving classmates gathered at Andrews Air Force Base Officers Club Saturday night to reminisce and to receive a second-hand message from Truman S. Klein, their former principal now confined to a nursing home in Western Maryland. ‘Tell ‘em,’ he had said, ‘hang in there.’

And hang on they did, the Surrattsville High School Class of 1939. Brought up in the Depression, they graduated into a world at war. Over the years, they saw their own immediate world change from rolling countryside to cookie-cutter subdivisions; their old community, Clinton, and their county, Prince George’s, altered almost beyond recognition.

The Clinton they once knew, a country crossroads of 250 people or so, is now a suburb of more than 10,000. Their old high school, later converted into a junior high school that was recently closed, was supplanted in 1960 by a new high school now undergoing renovation. And their county, which 45 years ago had 60,000 residents (compared to 40,000 in Montgomery) clustered mostly in towns near the District, now counts more than 10 times that many people.” ...

10. HORNET SHARES ADDITIONAL THOUGHTS AND MEMORIES. Many of our readers enjoyed the beautiful Memorial Day pieces by Bill Crawford (62) (bcraw44@gmail.com) in the last two e-Notice. (Bill's Memorial Day reminiscences were informed by his experience as a rifleman and later a combat photo-journalist in Viet Nam.) This comment from Duke Coleman (52) was typical: "OI recently re-read last month's article by Bill Crawford about his friend Ollie Noonan. Wow, what a writer he is. I have to tell you when I got to the part where he and his wife were in line for tickets at the ballpark, I knew way before he related it, and said to myself, he is going to get three tickets."

On a completely different topic, the following are some memories Bill shared about his experiences in Southern MD with musical legend and Accokeek resident Link Wray:

"[I recently thought] of an obscure but important artist from that time. If you grew up in the DC area and watched the Milt Grant Record Hop on WTTG, Channel 5, then you may remember Link Wray. The Shawnee Indian guitarist who grew up in Dunn, NC, was a big favorite of Uncle Milt. He changed the history of rock 'n roll guitar playing when he took a pencil and poked holes in his tiny amplifier one night during a Northern Virginia gig. He also reversed directions with his fingers across the strings and the power chord was born. His release of "Rumble" in 1958 changed R&R forever. The driving, relentless, cacaphonic beat was enough to rattle the filings in your teeth. It was the only instrumental to be banned from the radio during this exciting era when R&R was scaring the devil out of our parents and pastors. How good was Link Wray? When Rolling Stone named the 100 Best Guitarists of All Time he checked in at Number 45.

I saw him perform in person several times at Strick's, the Quonset Hut, etc. I was too young to even be in the parking lot of these infamous venues. Link Wray and the Wraymen were sizzling hot. They signed a record contract so they could compete with Duane Eddy and the Rebels. Both artists did versions of the classic "Rawhide." A very young Bob Dylan would later go electric after seeing LW perform. Peter Townshend of the Who said LW inspired him to pick up a guitar. Neil Young said in the 80s that if he could go back in time, the one band he would choose to see was Link Wray and the Wraymen. Santana and Hendrix openly acknowledged the LW influence. Years later, punk rock was born out of Link Wray riffs.

When Link died in 2005 the greats gave him a big nod. Dylan stepped to the mike during a concert and intoned, in a raspy voice, "This is in memory of Link Wray." His pounding rendition of "Rumble" lasted over ten minutes. Dylan and his band bludgeoned the audience with one of greatest instrumentals ever. Bruce Springsteen also interrupted a concert to send the E Street Band through a crushing rendition of "Rumble." This year LW is nominated to be inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall Of Fame. Long overdue! Take a minute to click this link and listen to a legend who helped make my teenage years special:
