**5.** <u>**BK MILLER FEATURED IN BANK NEWSLETTER.</u>** Former faculty member John Riedesel passed along a page from his bank's newsletter featuring a historic photo of a BK Miller delivery truck and the following very interesting text:</u>

"BK Miller was started in 1913 as a general store in Clinton, MD by Blossie Keuberth Miller. Through hard work and determination, he saved money to open a general store to serve his community, which had come upon hard times. IN the early 1940s, BK Miller became a developer in Clinton, building the town church, doctor's office, post office and super market. His business also expanded to wholesaling products to other markets in the area – the products ranged from farm and building supplies to groceries. Eventually, with the rise of chain grocery stores, BK Miller's changed from a super market to a super liquor store. In response to their customer's demand for fine meat and poultry, they continued to sell those products in addition to beverages.

BK Miller Meats & Liquors, Inc. is a thriving family owned business that has become a landmark in Clinton. While being highly successful, they still maintain that local General Store feel that has kept them in business for over 100 years. Customers can find everything they need right in the store just as their families had generations before. While changing times may have forced the businesses to operate independently, the Millers continue to be a very close knit family. This family bond is exactly why BK Miller Conmpany, Inc. and BK Miller Meats & Liquors, Inc. will continue to thrive for another 100 years."

6. <u>MORE MEMORIES FROM THE VIET NAM ERA</u>. Here's another interest memory from our "Vietnam correspondent," Bill Crawford (66):

"My Rendezvous with Jane Fonda Didn't Work Out. Jane Fonda arrived at the barricaded gate of Fort Hood, Texas with a small cadre of long haired ex-GIs fresh from a breakfast rally at the Oleo Strut. Barbarella was just beginning to make her mark as a Vietnam War protester in May of 1970. I abandoned my cluttered desk at the <u>Armored Sentinel</u> to check out the scene. I was a skinny, bespectacled nerd who was coming off an infantry tour in the Nam. The vagaries of the Jungle War had transformed me from a grunt into a combat photojournalist. I was anxiously awaiting discharge in June while writing for the base newspaper.

Fonda had not yet become "Hanoi Jane." This would come later as a result of her viral photo sitting at the controls of a North Vietnamese anti-aircraft gun in Hanoi. Today, she was leading soldiers that she met at the Oleo Strut, a local coffee house which was an unlikely bastion for the

anti-war movement in the staunchly conservative CenTex. The Strut featured a shadow menu of mind altering substances, and activists printed a counter culture newspaper there. Future film maker, David Zeiger, was a teenage employee. Much later, he chronicled the GI anti-war movement in the decorated documentary film, "Sir, No Sir."

Military Police were everywhere at the gate. A few soldiers like me arrived from work dressed in fatigues. As the protesters were turned away at the barricade, things turned serious inside the wire. MP's began wrestling with GI's. Handcuffs were applied, and some of us were whisked away in trucks to MP Headquarters. We were interrogated in turn, and then we were dispatched to face our individual commanding officers. The full bird colonel in charge of the <u>Armored</u> <u>Sentinel</u> was perplexed to see me. He quickly focused on the Combat Infantry Badge sewed on my fatigue shirt. "Disgraceful," he barked. "Why is a combat veteran like you consorting with those anti-war communists?"

My time in the Green Machine was running short. I wondered if the stockade loomed in my immediate future. Time spent there would not count toward discharge. My escape from the Army might be pushed way down the road. I had to pull something out of my butt right now! "Sir," I intoned in my best military voice. "If you had a body like Jane Fonda, I would go to the gate to see you!" The silence was both deafening and pregnant. "Crawford," the stern colonel finally snapped as he shifted to look out a nearby window. "When I turn back around, don't be here!" I bolted for the door like a scalded dog, and Jane Fonda soon headed to Hanoi to consort with the enemy. Today, her acting continues to be productive even as she is still vilified on various military websites.

And what of the Oleo Strut where Fonda flirted with the fledgling Texas anti-war movement? The smoky coffee house is etched in history as a seminal hotbed of activism for the committed ex-GIs who first brought the sordid events of the Nam home to the American public. This history is not acknowledged on any current military websites.

As we noted in our last issue, Duke Coleman (53) recently donated to the Foundation's Archives a number of copies of an early SHS student newspaper, the "Green Light." Those editions provide a fascinating glimpse into student life at Surrattsville during the 52-53 academic year, <u>63</u> years ago!

Here are some excerpts from the September 26, 1952 back-to-school edition of Green Light:

"Year's First 'Sing' Today: Today's Assembly will feature those who have represented out school on T.V. programs, as well as providing the school the opportunity of singing some of their old favorites, and some popular tunes."

"Assembly Pleases!!! Sixth graders, under the able direction of Mrs. Turner, were guest performers on Constitution Day. A beautiful facsimile of the Library of Congress Constitutional Shrine had been made by the sixth grade, and proved an impressive background for the assembly program. The program proper opened with "The Star Spangled Banner" – three verses led by Helen Bovbjerg. The sixth grade then gave a skit on "The Constitution Lives" – present against the shrine background. The Voice of the Constitution was Betty Kenyon. The sixth grade Chorus concluded their part of the program with "The Battle Hymn of the Replublic" – assisted by the H.S. Music Class. Little known facts about the Constitution were then presented by the members of the Problems of Democracy class, under the direction of Mr. Mulkey. Mr. Pryde then briefly addressed the group, reminding us that Constitution Day is Citizenship Day. The singing of "Maryland, My Maryland" closed the program."

"You school paper costs one cent per page! Support it!"
