5. ACHIEVEMENT AWARD RECIPIENT EARNS ULTIMATE DISTINCTION! A number of our readers reported on an absolutely wonderful Washington Post article (with photos and an on-line video) by Maura Judkis about a truly singular achievement by Foundation Achievement Award recipient Patrick O’Connell (63), (<http://surrattsville.org/achievement/2007.shtml>). Here are some excerpts:

“The Inn at Little Washington Earns Its Third Michelin Star, a First for the D.C. Region:

"It's clear that Washington now has joined the ranks of the great gastronomic capitals of the world," says the Michelin Guide's director. There's an old French adage about the Michelin Guide, the famed little red restaurant rating book: "It takes three generations to get three stars," the guide's top rating. It used to be that top European restaurants would be handed down through families, each descendant improving on his father's work.

In the case of chef Patrick O’Connell of the Inn at Little Washington, it took only three years to get three stars. The Michelin Guide announced Thursday that it added a coveted third star to the Inn’s previous designation, making it the first restaurant in the Washington area to earn three stars. “That a kid from South Capitol Street, via Clinton, Maryland, who worked in a Mr. H hamburgers ... can teach himself to cook and measure his progress every year against the greatest restaurants in the world, realizing that if he kept at it and [was] committed and willing to sacrifice, [he] could make an achievement like this, it’s like being in the midst of a fairy tale,” O’Connell said.

The Michelin Guide’s arrival in Washington three years ago cemented the city’s status as a serious food destination. But with its first three-star restaurant, “It’s clear that Washington now has joined the ranks of the great gastronomic capitals of the world,” said Michael Ellis, the outgoing international director for the Michelin Guides.

The Inn, a restaurant and hotel modeled on the three-star inns of France, was elevated in the ratings this year after many visits, Ellis said, from “both the U.S. team as well as the international team. I had lot of French inspectors there.” Inspectors praised “the attention to detail on the plate,” Ellis said. “Also, he really has elevated the execution of his sauces to a degree that was just amazing.”

O’Connell’s third star coincides with the Inn’s 40th anniversary, an event the chef has feted throughout the year. Anniversaries are not something that Michelin takes into account, said Ellis, who called it a “nice coincidence.” “To have him, in his 40th year of his activity, have the ultimate accolade from Michelin and our universe is a source of great pleasure for all of us,” Ellis said. O’Connell said that he and his staff had been working intensely all year to achieve the third star. “We thought we had given it everything we had last year. But that wasn’t the case —

we had more to give,” O’Connell said. “And we exceeded our own expectations this year with not only our efforts but our ability to form an intense common bond. There isn’t anyone in the operation right now” — from the cooks to the servers to the gardeners — “who isn’t all in, in wanting this acknowledgment.”

But for O’Connell, who has worked his entire career for the honor, it’s an occasion for a major celebration. He recalled an employee asking him, years ago, what would happen if the Inn were to earn three stars. “I said ... ‘Champagne would be flowing in the streets of Little Washington. I hope big Washington is celebrating, too, and they realize that anything we can do collectively together to put the nation’s capital on the radar of the international culinary scene benefits everyone.’”

Congratulations to Patrick and his staff on this absolutely extraordinary achievement!

10. MORE HISTORICAL TREASURES FROM 1964-1967 SURVEYORS! Here are more treasures from The Surveyor from the 1964-1967 period. Thanks to Nancy Miller (67) and the Class of 67 for donating these "journalistic time capsules" to the Foundation Archives! The following are some excerpts from the January 1965 issue:

"Itinerary Set for Visitors: On January 14, Surrattsville will welcome foreign visitors from the Washington International Center. The tour of Surrattsville is sponsored by an agency to further international development. Our visitors will therefore be from the underdeveloped countries of the world, particularly Southeast Asia, Africa and Latin America. Europeans will not be represented in the group since the European project of assistance has been completed. The group will be representative of various occupations, such as engineers, aviators and agriculturalists. Only a small number of educators participate in the project. Our guests will arrive at Surrattsville at 11:30 a.m. Before coming to the school, the foreigners will have had lectures on the American school system. After a greeting from our administration and a briefing on the traditions and statistics unique to Surrattsville, the visitors will dine in our cafeteria. After lunch, student guides will take small groups on a tour of the school which will include the guidance department, the home economics and shop classes, the language labs, the gymnasium, science laboratories, the music department, and the office. After the general tour, the visitors may want to revisit specific areas that interest them. At 2:30, the foreigners will depart, taking with them new ideas and outlooks gained from three hours spent in an American school, Surrattsville.

Alumni Advises College-Bound: The fourth annual Christmas Alumni Program was presented December 22, at 1:30 p.m. For the last four years, Surrattsville graduates have returned at

Christmas to give college-bound seniors helpful suggestions about college life. The 19 representatives, from colleges all over the country, told of experiences they had, concerning such topics as adjustments to living quarters, working habits, college tests, and grades.

Varsity Club Inducts: Twenty-one boys were inducted into the Varsity Club on November 20. Although the induction ceremony was reported to be “slightly more rigorous” than the gentle rose-tapping of the N.H.S., the inductees admitted that “it was worth it.” The following were inducted: Bob Wechsler, Dick Wechsler, Alvin Thomas, Jack Shuler, Charles Moser, Dwight Holm, James Muelchi, Carl Scott, Norman Meyers, Manuel Currea, John Clendinen, Alan Porter, Tom Fitzpatrick, Harry Shisler, Pat Fahey, Larry Shillings, Paul Curto, Skip Hale, Ernie Reese, John Cook and Reggie Masano. To be eligible for membership in the club the boys have to have a good standing at Surrattsville, a letter in a varsity sport, and a 2.0 average. The eligible boys must then be accepted by 2/3 of the members of the club.”

[Ed. Note: Yes, young readers, girls weren't allowed to participate in sports in those ancient times, or even during my very recent – geologically speaking -- attendance years of 1968-1971!]

11. ... AND MORE HISTORICAL TREASURES FROM “GREEN LIGHT.” As we previously noted, in 2015 Duke Coleman (53) donated to the Foundation's Archives a number of copies of an early SHS student newspaper, the “Green Light.” Those editions provide a fascinating glimpse into student life at Surrattsville during the 52-53 academic year, 66 years ago! Here are some excerpts from the April 30, 1953 edition:

“Girls Attend Playday: Monday several girls attended a playday at Gwynn Park. The girls who attended were Shelby Coffey, Doris Hamby, Betty Lou Hill, Frances Kissinger, Madeline Kimble, Dorothy Miller, Josephine Parker, Evelyn Wood, Marie Anderson, Mary Roylance, Pat Theunisson, Lynn Robinson, Mildred Wood, Carolyn Dill, Pat Williams, Betty Lou Liggan, Mona Napier, Jo Ann Simpkins, Barbara Simpkins, Violet Dickerson, and Joyce Maynard. The girls enjoyed it very much and are looking forward to a return visit. The 10th grade girls won their ball games, 10-3 and 4-3. Congratulations!

The Record Shop: Percy Faith and Felecia Sanders have one of the hottest discs of the day in “The Song from Moulin Rouge.” The only trouble is that Felecia is not getting rich from royalties. She waxed the disc for a flat sum. The flip of it, “Swedi Rhapsody,” is selling pretty well, too. Miss Sanders, however, doesn't sing on this side. Mercury has released the word that Patti Page's platter, “Doggie in the Window,” has sold over two million copies. Patti has another disc that should prove to be a hit, “Now That I'm In Love,” written to the strains of the “William Tell Overture.” It is selling well, and should soon be a hit. “Dancing with Someone,” Teresa Brewer's latest, was sung by her on her appearance on the Abbott and Costello Show Sunding night. Our Miss Brewer is also somewhat of a dancer – she danced a real cute number with the chorus, to the melody of a song that has come to be her theme, “Roll the Roly Boly Eyes,” “I Believe,” written especially for Jane Froman, is very pretty, when it is sun by Miss Froman.

Frankie Laine's version is alright, but the Capitol disc is far superior. "Two's Company," the show that starred Bette Davis, has an RCA album out. It includes most of Bette's imitations, even her remarkable imitation of Tallulah! So long for this week.

Helen Bovbjerg sings at a wedding the weekend. Whose? Jeannette Williams, of the Class of 51. Best wishes, Jeannette! Kenneth and his violin – accompanied by Lorraine Bush – play at a concert at District Heights this weekend. Mrs. Roland substituted for Mrs. Moorehead on Monday, and the 8Bs are grateful for that pleasant rendition of Strauss! Thank you, Mrs. Roland!"

13. PAID COLLEGE AND HIGH SCHOOL 2019 INTERNSHIPS OFFERED BY THE NAVY. We received this tip about paid Summer 2019 internship opportunities from Neal Dawson (73):

"NREIP and SEAP applications for 2019 due Oct. 31. The application period for both the 2019 college-level Naval Research Enterprise Internship Program (NREIP) and the 2019 high school-level Science and Engineering Apprenticeship Program (SEAP) is now through Oct. 31.

These programs provide an opportunity for students to participate in research at a Department of Navy (DoN) laboratory during the summer. NREIP provides competitively selected research internships for 475 college students (400 undergraduate students and 75 graduate students) each year, and SEAP provides 265 competitively selected research internships each year.

SEAP is open to high school students (16 years and older). It pays \$3,300 for new students and \$3,800 for returning students for the eight-week summer internship. More information and details about eligibility can be found at <http://seap.asee.org/>.

NREIP is a 10-week internship open to both undergraduate and graduate students. The stipend levels for NREIP are:

Level 1 (\$5,400): New (first-time) NREIP

Level 2 (\$8,100): Returning NREIP

Level 3 (\$10,800): Proof of enrollment in graduate school
