"Sauntering Surveyor: The "Sauntering Surveyor" made a final sentimental journey through Surrattsville's halls and the feminine half of this famous spy team couldn't help but shed a tear as the realization came that this was the final Sauntering Surveyor column that she would write. Graduation brings about mixed emotions – it is perhaps the only time the sophomores can enjoy the status of being envied by the seniors, as we are finishing what they are just beginning. Through farewell eyes, the Sauntering Surveyor played the last "I Spy" and observed some particular quirks. First off, we'd like to offer congratulations to the sophomores who finally found their court ... Glenn Hopkins astounds everyone with his impressive imitation of a piece of bacon. With such talent to his credit, Glenn will surely go far in this world ... Evidently, Mrs. Johnson doesn't take too well to baseball games played in the Junior Court, as one such game which promised to be a season great was called to a halt by the tennis racket wielding Mrs. J ... Joan (sister of Jane) was having a wild time in the cafeteria with that squirt gun. Thought they went out with hopscotch and undershirts, Joan? ... During English class Debbie Ehrhardt can show you a variety of lipsticks in all colors and flowers ... What really goes on in the dark room? ... Any banshee-like wails perceived in the English wing are sure to be coming from Mrs.

Olinger's up and coming English students who are presenting Pygmalion (My Fair Lady). Here I met up with a special friend (affectionately called "Grunt") who has helped me find my way when I got "lost" while wandering the great expanse of Surratts. Thank you, Special Friend. The foyer looks like a flea market when everyone gets together and sells during lunch ... Are Duncan and Parker really as great as they are? ... A last look into Mrs. Johnson's office revealed the seniors picking up their announcements. This traveler did – kind of half-heartedly though, when I remembered what they stood for: graduation, tears, departures, college, and farewells ... Goodbye.

Seniors Donate Traditional Gifts: As their traditional gift to the school, the senior class will place the school seal near the flag pole in front of the school. In memory of Mr. Pryde, they will contribute the remainder of their funds to the John M. Pryde Memorial Library. The senior class gift was originated by the class of 1956. From 1960 until 1966 the gifts were placed in the Senior Court."

12. ... AND MORE HISTORICAL TREASURES FROM "GREEN LIGHT." As we previously noted, in 2015 Duke Coleman (53) donated to the Foundation's Archives a number of copies of an early SHS student newspaper, the "Green Light." Those editions provide a fascinating glimpse into student life at Surrattsville during the 52-53 academic year, 66 years ago! Here are some excerpts from the April 30, 1953 edition:

"Music Notes: Reports on composers this week have proved interesting and entertaining. In 7B Music, June Shifflett and Jean Merriman gave a report on Frederic Chopin, with Bonnie Sellner playing a Prelude, John Page an Air with Variations, and Helen Bovbjerg a Masurka of Chopin's. The class enjoyed further information about Chopin and his music when Mrs. Moorehead played the record from our Masters series. Harriet Lusk and Kathy Hummer were the committee from 7th grade for the famous Mendelssohn. Harriet's painting illustrating "Midsummer Night's Dream" is on display and Jean Reasebeck's portrait of Mendelssohn is posted on the bulletin board. In 7A, Jay Irving and Paula Jones presented an original skit in preparation for their report.

Next week is National Music Week, and Prince George's County is honoring it by concerts throughout the County. Our school goes to Oxon Hill, in presenting a concert with Gwynn Park HS, Laurel, Frederick Sasscer, and Oxon Hill.

Junior Class News: Everyone who attended the Prom reported that they had a wonderful time and we are glad they did. The Junior Class would like to thank the following people for helping to make our dance a success: Mrs. Noyes, Mr. Pugh, Mr. Pryde, Mrs. Maust, Mrs. Merritt, and Mr. Hill. Congratulations to the following girls who are on the May Court: Lois Hinchliffe, Myra Rogor, Betty Anne Shifflett, and Janet Goddard. Belated Happy Birthday wishes to John Sickler. Some of the Junior girls are going to be in the 4-H Chorus which is going to sing at the Folk Festival at Frederick Sasser High School on Saturday evening May 2 at 8 p.m.”

13. A HISTORY OF THE TUESDAY BOOTS. In response to a request included in the most recent e-Notice, Russ Barkley (67) kindly sent along the following history of The Tuesday Boots, but had to report that he and his brother Jerry (the drummer in the band) know of no audio recording of that ensemble. We nation of fans will have to call up in our memories the sight and sound of one of Surrattsville’s most accomplished and beloved bands as we read this fascinating history:

“A History of the Tuesday Boots Band. By Russell and Jerry Barkley, 2/2/2015: The band, *Tuesday Boots*, originally formed in Clinton, MD as *The Cavaliers* in late summer of 1964 as the inspiration of the Barkley brothers, Ron, Russ, and Jerry, and close friend Ron Lilly (aka Ron Jones). An early photo of the band can be found at the Surrattsville High School Foundation website. Ron Barkley played lead guitar and sang lead on most vocals, with Ron Lilly playing rhythm guitar and contributing harmonizing vocals, Jerry Barkley on drums and vocals, and Russ Barkley on bass.

Ron, Russ, and Jerry had grown up in various states on the East Coast (Florida, New York, Maryland) due to their father being in the U.S. Air Force. But they spent a large part of their childhood and youth in Maryland due to their father being periodically stationed at Andrews Air Force Base. In the summer of 1964, after moving back to Maryland (Clinton) from Newburgh, NY, the three brothers formed their first band, *The Cavaliers*, along with their new neighbor, Surrattsville High School classmate, and friend, Ron Lilly.

The band typically rehearsed at the Barkley home, originally on Arbroath Drive in Dorchester Estates, Clinton, MD. Then later on practices took place at their Sweeney Drive residence, also in Clinton, MD. The Band’s first “gig” was for a house party for Linda Diehl, a fellow Surrattsville student, in the Fall of 1964. By early 1965, the band had played at other student parties. Throughout that year, it had expanded its range of performances to the campers’ graduation party at Camp Yocomico on Andrews Air Force Base, and then on to multiple appearances at dances at Surrattsville Junior and Senior High Schools, and at teen club at Taney Junior High School in Camp Springs, MD.

By October of 1965 the name of the band was changed to *Tuesday Boots*, a phrase modified from a song titled “Thirsty Boots” written by Eric Henderson, but performed at the time by Bob Dylan. The band considered calling itself Thursday Boots but settled eventually on the official name, *Tuesday Boots*. As such, the band continued to occasionally play at the schools noted above as well as at Crossland High School dances, various “battle of the bands” performances in

the area, the Clinton Fire Department Saturday night dances, at the Suitland Fire Department Saturday night dance hall, Andrews Air Force Base Officers Club (pool party), Bolling Air Force Base enlisted men's club, Henderson Hall, Fort Belvoir, Quantico Marine Base, and even St. Elizabeth's Hospital.

During this time, Jerry was playing a set of Leedy/Ludwig drums with Zildjian cymbals. Ron Barkley was playing various guitars, including a Fender Stratocaster, a Gibson guitar, and Rickenbacker 12-string guitar. Ron Lilly was playing a Fender Stratocaster, and Russ was playing a Fender Jazz bass guitar. All three guitarists were playing through Fender amplifiers.

As the band perfected its craft and became more widely known it also performed in various Washington, DC nightclubs, such as at Harrigans, and the Georgetown nightclubs Crazy Horse, the Corral, Silver Dollar, and The Cellar Door, among others.

As for their musical repertoire, the *Tuesday Boots* performed a few songs from the California surfing and hot rod musical genres of the time, including Wipe Out, songs from *The Beach Boys* (Fun, Fun, Fun, Little Deuce Coupe, Help Me Rhonda, Barbara Ann), *The Kingsmen* (Louie Louie), and *Paul Revere and the Raiders* (Kicks, Just Like Me). But most of their music came from the groups that formed the "British Invasion" into the U.S. music scene at the time. This music included numerous *Beatles* songs (I Want to Hold Your Hand, Rollover Beethoven, Hard Days Night, Johnny B Good, and many others), as well as hits from *The Rolling Stones* (Satisfaction, Get off of My Cloud, Under My Thumb, Ruby Tuesday), *Eric Burdon and the Animals* (House of the Rising Sun), *The Beau Brummels* (Laugh, Laugh), the *Dave Clark Five* (Glad All Over, Bits and Pieces), and *The Kinks* (All Day and All of the Night), among others. As folk rock became popular, the band also performed songs by *The Birds* (Mr. Tambourine Man, Turn Turn Turn), and other U.S. bands in that genre.

By 1966 the group had linked up with Fordy Thompson, a talent booking agent in the DC area (who also managed the popular band *Little Joe and the Imperials*). This partnership thereby helped to further increase the group's playing opportunities at nightclubs and military bases in the greater DC area. During that time, the band added a fifth member, Bruce MacPherson, as a keyboard player (using a Wurlitzer electric organ/piano). During this year, the band also appeared on a local TV dance show similar to the nationally televised American Bandstand. The program was called *Wing Ding* and was hosted by radio rock jock Kirby Scott. For that appearance, the *Boots* covered Dirty Water by the Standells.

Though the talent agency with which they were working greatly expanded the bookings of the band, it also made a few errors in judgment as to the venues it selected for the band. For instance, the band made a rare and obviously inappropriate appearance at a country and western bar in southeastern Pennsylvania fronting for a more locally known band, *Venus and Her Fly Traps*, as well as another such country bar in Southern Maryland (Charles County). But mostly the group played in the greater DC area.

The original band dissolved in the Summer of 1967, when Russ Barkley headed for college at the

University of Maryland, and Ron Barkley and Ron Lilly headed to the Los Angeles, CA area to try and further their musical careers.

But Ron Lilly returned to Maryland within a few months and formed a new version of the band. He recruited Scott Thompson (on lead guitar) and John Jarvis (lead singer), with Ron Lilly now playing bass guitar. Jerry Barkley joined them as drummer and the *Tuesday Boots* were back in business. A bit later, Doug Gwen joined them on keyboard. This version of the band played in the greater DC area until mid-1968, performing at many of the same venues as the original band (see above).

Then, later in 1968, Jerry Barkley left the group to move to California to work with brother Ron Barkley. Ron Lilly kept the remaining members of *Tuesday Boots* together and recruited Bob Venables, an earlier classmate at Surrattsville High School (Class of '67, now deceased), to replace Jerry Barkley on drums. That version of the band (and its name) moved on shortly thereafter to play in the Boston area for about two years before dissolving.

In the summer of 1969, both Ron and Jerry Barkley returned from California to the greater DC area. They formed yet another version of *Tuesday Boots* by recruiting Dennis Boone for lead vocals and rhythm guitar and Jan Zukowski on bass guitar and vocals. They played at high schools, Prince George's Community College, and many of the clubs and bars at which the original *Tuesday Boots* band had played (see above), but especially the Georgetown nightclubs. For instance, they were the house band at various times for the Corral and Crazy Horse nightclubs in Georgetown. And so for a while, two versions of the band, *Tuesday Boots*, existed – one (involving the Barkley brothers) in the greater DC area and the other (involving Ron Lilly) in the Boston area.

The Barkleys' band, *Tuesday Boots*, that performed in the greater DC area continued to play songs from some of the earlier British music noted above but also new material from the 1968-69 era including *Jimi Hendrix*, *Cream*, *Led Zeppelin*, and *Buffalo Springfield*. But they also added new material including popular R & B music, such as songs by James Brown (I Feel Good), Wilson Pickett (Mustang Sally, 634-5789), and Sam and Dave (Hold on, I'm Coming), and many others. This "second generation" of the Barkleys' band broke up in 1970 after a year of performing together.

Ron Barkley moved on to play with the band, *Leaves of Grass*, Jan Zukowski joined up with the group, *The Cherry People*, and Jerry Barkley and Dennis Boone formed the band, *Boone's Farm*. By the Fall of 1972, Ron Barkley had married and left the DC area to reside and play with bands in various states in the Southern U.S. eventually landing in Florida. His last group performances were with the *Gulf Coasters* in the late 1990s into 2004 playing in the Naples, FL region and other Gulf coast cities of Florida. Jerry Barkley also eventually relocated to this same city and periodically played with brother Ron in this and other bands.

Ron Barkley moved to Elizabethtown, NY about 2004 and died in 2006 in a car accident. Ron Lilly had eventually returned to the Maryland area and passed away in 2005 of natural causes.

Jerry Barkley continues to reside in Naples, FL. And Russ Barkley lives in the Richmond, VA region.

While the *Tuesday Boots* never recorded any commercial records, the band was a very popular group in the Washington, DC area during the 1964-1970 period. (NOTE: More recently this band name was adopted by a progressive folk music group from Cork County, Ireland, that now has a presence on *YouTube* but has no relation to the original band or its members)."

[Ed. Personal Note: What a special final article for your retiring Editor! I can remember like it was yesterday the first time I saw The Tuesday Boots – then The Barkleys – playing at a pool party for Rob Lifton at my great pal Rick Lifton’s house on Victoria Drive. Watching them surreptitiously from the bushes, I got the bug, bad, and more than a half century later I still have the extraordinary and regular pleasure of playing live with my current band, that includes Hornet Roger Owens (73). Thanks, Tuesday Boots/Barkleys, for the inspiration!]
